ENTRY INFORMATION

- 2.) Mailed entry- only checks or money orders in US Funds only are accepted. Please make a single check/money order payable to Houghton University. For security, NO CREDIT CARDS accepted for mailed entries. Show entry <u>must</u> be postmarked by the closing date.

E-mailed entries will NOT be accepted.

Reminder: This prize list covers two shows. You must submit TWO entry forms if entering both shows. Payment required with entry. Each horse/rider combination requires a separate entry form.

Entry is not complete until payment is received. Checks will be deposited upon receipt. No post-dated checks accepted. Dishonored checks or declined credit cards will require complete repayment prior to the show plus a service charge of \$30. All outstanding fees must be paid before show packets are issued. No bridle number will be issued without full payment and completed entry, including signatures and emergency contact information.

Complete entries MUST include USEF and USDF member numbers and signatures of owner/rider/trainer/coach or non-member fee(s) where applicable; USDF and USEF horse Registration/Recording number(s) (where applicable); and a copy of a negative Coggins taken within 12 months of the show dates showing the same horse name as on the entry (GR907.4) A parent or guardian signing on behalf of a junior exhibitor does not need to be a USEF member. Freestyle classes must include copy of qualifying test with entry. All entries must include the USEF Waiver and Release of Liability (page 28).

Entries missing any of these items will be considered incomplete. Incomplete/incorrect entry fee is \$25.

Entries are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis based on postmark or online entry date and entries may be limited. Those entries postmarked after closing will be accepted at the discretion of the show secretary, based on a space available basis, and charged a \$25 late fee per show. If the classes are oversubscribed, a Waiting List (in the order of receipt) will be maintained. Management reserves the right to refuse any entry. Entries may close early if time limits for judges are filled. Remaining entries will be placed on a wait list. Late entries, if accepted, must be complete and submitted by 11 a.m. the day before start of class. Late Entries will not be included in the program.

Great American/USDF Qualifying Classes Indicate the class entered is to count for qualifying by placing a Q after the class number on your entry. Qualifying does not require a separate ride. An exhibitor riding in the Open, AA, Young Rider, or Junior classes must pay an additional \$15 USDF qualifying fee to have this score entered in the GAIG/USDF qualifying division at that level. RIDERS must have an active USEF Membership and a USDF Participating Membership. OWNERS must have a USDF Participating or Business Membership and a USEF membership (Junior Active, Senior Active, Life, or Recorded Farm (with Active Farm Owner)). If the horse has more than one owner, at least one owner must have both active USEF membership and active USDF Participating or Business Membership. For a business or farm to be the valid owner under this requirement, it must be listed as an owner of the horse with both USEF and USDF. HORSES must be Annual or Lifetime Recorded with USEF and USDF Lifetime Registered, an HID is not sufficient.

<u>Conditions of entry</u> Every horse entered for competition will be under the control of the Horse Show Management, but the Horse Show Management will, in no case, be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur, and it shall be a condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold the Horse Show Management, Facility and its Directors harmless for any loss or accident to his horse, horses or equipment which may occur from sickness, fire or otherwise.

Confirmation of entry will be e-mailed. All e-mail addresses must be CLEARLY printed. Times will be posted on www.horseshowoffice.com & www.wnyda.org by May 23rd, 2024

HORSE/RIDER MEMBERSHIPS & SAFESPORT

A **TRAINER**, as listed on the entry form, is defined as any adult (18 & older) who has responsibility for the care, custody or performance of the horse while the horse is on the competition grounds. This adult must sign the entry form as trainer. If the rider is considered the trainer, the rider must sign as the trainer. A **COACH**, as listed on the entry form, is defined as an adult (18 & older) who gets paid for instructing, teaching, schooling or advising a rider with their horse on the competition grounds. This adult must sign the entry form as coach. If there is no coach, the signature for coach may be left blank.

<u>USEF/USDF Horse ID Requirement</u> All horses entered in USEF/USDF recognized shows must at least have a <u>USDF & USEF</u> HID (Horse Identification) number in order to participate. If riding in qualifying classes, you must have a USDF Lifetime Registration in addition to a USEF Annual or Lifetime Recording. These horse identification numbers may be obtained from USEF and USDF. Exempt from this requirement are horses showing only in Introductory Level, Pas de Deux, Quadrille, Opportunity Classes, Leadline, and Exhibitions.

Membership/Non-Member/Proof of Membership fees All participants (rider, owner, trainer, agent, lessee, or coach) must present to the competition secretary a current USEF membership number. As of 12/1/2022, only one Show Pass Form is allowed per competition year. If you have already submitted a Show Pass Form for the year, a competing membership is required.

Please Note: Competing membership is required for Trainers/Coaches, and this includes parents signing as trainers. Refer to GR 202.1 for more information. All Riders and Owners must present a current USDF Participating, Group, or Business (owners only) membership number or pay a \$35 USDF non-membership fee per show. Those who cannot provide proof of their USDF membership

may fill out an affidavit form and must pay the \$5 fee. The affidavit may also be used to verify horse registration and/or horse ownership. The USDF Affidavit Form may be found on www.USDF.org Exempt from this requirement are individuals competing only in Introductory Level, Pas de Deux, Quadrille, Opportunity Classes, Leadline, and Exhibitions.

Non-U.S. Citizens and Foreign Competitors are required to join USEF as Competing Members. Those individuals 18 years of age and older must take SafeSport Training to be eligible to participate in USEF national competitions. For those participating in FEI events only, this requirement does not apply. As of December 1, 2023, EC Sport License Holders Participating in USEF- National Competitions will now be required to join USEF as Competing Members at no cost.

<u>USEF SAFESPORT TRAINING REQUIREMENTS TO COMPETE</u> Effective January 1, 2019, every USEF adult member (18 & older) with an active senior competing membership must complete USEF's Safe Sport Training, overseen by the U.S. Center for SafeSport. An adult member may be OWNER, RIDER, TRAINER and/or COACH. Adult members listed on the entry must complete the entire course and be Safe Sport Trained before the first day of competition. Safe Sport Training must be completed by all adult members on the entry or the rider will not be allowed to compete. You may access the Safe Sport modules from your USEF member dashboard at www.usef.org.

ATTENTION COMPETITORS

Each competitor is responsible for supplying management with correct applicable numbers (USDF and USEF) for horse, owner, rider, and trainer, before the day(s) of the competition.

The scores of competitors who fail to supply correct numbers may not be counted toward national awards.



CLASS LIMITATIONS, OPPORTUNITY CLASSES & EQUITATION

<u>Consecutive Levels</u> Horses may enter no more than two consecutive levels, Freestyle levels included, at any one Competition. Refer to DR119.2 for levels chart.

<u>Classes per Day</u> Horses are limited to a maximum of three Dressage rides per day at Fourth Level and below or two Dressage rides per day above Fourth Level. Horses competing at both Fourth Level and Prix St. Georges, or their equivalents, are limited to two Dressage rides per day. Dressage Seat Equitation, Quadrille, Pas de Deux and Materiale classes are excluded from the maximum limit of rides per day and horses in these classes may compete at any level for which they are otherwise eligible during the same competition.

Opportunity Classes Opportunity classes are intended for entry level riders. Horses and riders entered only in "Opportunity" classes are exempt from USEF and USDF membership requirements and do not have to pay non-member (show pass) or HID fees. Federation and drug fees do not apply. Horses entered only in these classes are still subject to and must comply with the Drugs and Medication rules and are subject to drug testing. Riders and/or horses entered in "opportunity" classes may not cross-enter in other recognized classes at the show. Participants must abide by all USEF regulations pertaining to attire, tack, and equipment for the recognized show. DR120.5 Riders in Opportunity classes in Level 2 and Level 3 Competitions, may compete wearing breeches and shirts of any color as permitted in DR120.8. Jackets or vests of any type are allowed but not required and neckwear may be worn only if the rider chooses to compete in a riding jacket. Boots and protective headgear are required as specified in DR120.1-6. USEF rule GR821 for additional information on opportunity classes.

<u>Dressage Seat Medal Program</u> The USEF/USDF Dressage Seat Medal Program, for riders ages 18 and under, celebrates excellence in equitation and strives to develop a solid foundation for future success in the dressage arena. Riders wishing to qualify for the USEF Dressage Seat Medal Finals must compete in the USDF Dressage Seat Medal Semi-Finals held at the Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional Championships. To qualify for the USDF Dressage Seat Medal Semi-Finals, a competitor must earn a qualifying score of 70% or above in any eligible Dressage Seat Equitation class (except walk/trot) held at a USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized dressage competition during the qualifying period or by qualifying for the Great American Insurance Group/USDF Regional Championships. The top two placing riders in the Semi-Finals are automatically invited to the Finals.

<u>USDF Regional Adult Amateur Equitation Program</u> Rider must be an Adult Amateur (age 22 and up) and have a USDF participating membership at the time the qualifying score is earned. Horse must have a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration when the qualifying score is earned. To be eligible for the USDF Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final class, rider must have earned a score of 70% or higher in any dressage seat equitation class within the qualifying period or qualify to compete in any regional dressage championship class (excluding freestyles.)

Regional Adult Amateur Equitation Program

The USDF Regional Adult Amateur Equitation Program recognizes adult amateurs competing in equitation and promotes correct seat, position, and use of the aids in dressage. An Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final class presented by Big Dee's Tack and Vet Supply will be held in conjunction with each of the nine USDF Regional Dressage Championship competitions, providing adult amateurs with additional opportunity for recognition.

Adult amateurs wishing to qualify to compete in an Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final may do so by meeting the following requirements.

Qualifying Requirements

To be eligible for the USDF Adult Amateur Equitation Regional Final class, rider must have

- Earned a score of 70% or higher in any dressage seat equitation class (except walk/trot) at a USEF-licensed/USDF-recognized Dressage competition within the qualifying period of the applicable regional championship.
- b) Qualified to compete in any regional dressage championship class (excluding freestyles).

Membership Requirements

- Rider must have a USDF Participating Membership at the time the qualifying score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.
- Rider must be an adult amateur, in accordance with GR1306 of the USEF rules, and be designated with USEF as an adult amateur when the score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.
- Owner must have a USDF Participating or Business Membership when the qualifying score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.
- Horse must have a USDF Lifetime Horse Registration when the qualifying score is earned, and at the time of the Regional Final class.

OFFICE INFORMATION

Office Hours-The show office and stabling will open at 3:00 p.m. Thursday of competition weekend. During the show, the show office will be open one hour before the first ride until one hour after the last ride.

Ride Times-Provisional times will be available at www.horseshowoffice.com. Management reserves the right to change the time schedule after tentative times have been posted. It is the responsibility of the rider to inform the management of any time conflicts as soon as possible after receiving the schedule. Official ride times will be available at noon the day before each show. Check online or the official posting of ride times at the office for ride times. This show follows USEF GR830 with regard to rescheduled ride times.

Any changes after closing date initiated by rider or owner will incur a \$30 per change fee.

Schedule-Classes may not necessarily be run in the order listed in the class lists.

<u>Schooling</u> will begin Thursday at 3:00pm of show weekend. All competitors must have their current issued bridle number before riding. Schooling on Thursday will continue until 8:00 p.m. Friday schooling will be available after the show until 6:00 p.m.

<u>Hand-walking</u> of unmounted horses is allowed around the <u>exterior</u> of the competition rings from sunrise until 30 minutes prior to the first ride. No mounted horses allowed.

<u>Leaving the Competition</u>-No exhibitor may withdraw horses from a licensed show after it has commenced or remove them from the show grounds without permission of the show secretary.

Bridle numbers-All horses must always wear current issued bridle numbers when out of stall.

Anyone mounting, getting on, riding or trying a horse at the facility during the weekend of the show (including warmup day) must sign a show release form in the show office.

Please contact show secretary for any questions regarding entering competition/entry forms.

<u>Freestyles/Music</u>: Music for all freestyles on CD in WAV format must be given to the show office upon arrival. Sound checks will be conducted Thursday late afternoon/early evening. Other times must be arranged with show management. Competitors are responsible to picking up their music before the end of the show. Music left will not be mailed. DR129.9

DR 129.9: "Except for USEF/USDF Championship classes and for FEI Pony Riders, FEI Junior and FEI Young Rider Freestyles, in order to enter a freestyle class at any level, a horse/rider combination must have received a minimum score of 63% for Training through Fourth levels and 60% for FEI levels in the highest test of the declared freestyle level or any test of a higher level at a Federation /USDF Licensed Dressage Competition or FEI recognized Dressage Competition or "open" Dressage class (i.e. open to all breeds) at a Federation Licensed Competition held prior to the competition where the horse/rider combination is entered to ride a freestyle class. To enter an FEI Para Dressage Freestyle class, a horse/rider combination must have received a minimum score of 60% in any FEI Para Dressage test (Para Novice Test, Para Intermediate Test or Para Grand Prix Test) at the rider's classified Grade. This score may be earned at a USEF/USDF licensed Dressage Competition or FEI recognized Dressage Competition or "open" Dressage class (i.e. open to all breeds) at a Federation Licensed Competition held prior to the competition where the horse/rider combination is entered to ride a freestyle class. A photocopy of the test verifying eligibility, or copy of the USDF score verification, must be submitted with the entry for a freestyle class. All FEI Pony Rider Tests are equivalent to Second Level; all FEI Junior Tests are equivalent to Third Level; all FEI Young Rider Tests are equivalent to PSG; and the USEF Brentina Cup (Young Adult) Test and FEI Young Rider Grand Prix 16-25 Tests are equivalent to Intermediate II. For purposes of freestyle qualification, all are considered equivalent to the highest test of that level and may be used to enter a freestyle at that level or a level below. Young Horse and FEI Children Tests cannot be used for freestyle qualification at any level."





- Submit two CDs of your music clearly labeled with your name, horse's name, bridle number, and freestyle level.
- Be present for your sound check.
- Know the rules for the level you are riding. This includes forbidden and allowed movements for your level.

STABLING & GROUNDS INFORMATION

Smoking/vaping and alcohol is prohibited on the premises.

No staples or nails are allowed to be affixed to any Houghton University Equestrian Center Property. Individuals wishing to tape advertisements or flyers to the walls must first obtain approval from Show Management.

Stabling Permanent box stalls 10'x10' or larger with doors on grounds. Shavings are not included but can be pre-ordered & paid for. Shavings not pre-ordered ahead of show can be purchased on site based on availability. Competitors may arrive 3:00p.m. Thursday. If only showing Saturday, may arrive 6 p.m. Friday. Send stabling fees with your entry form. Three wash racks w/hot-cold water are available. Early arrival either day MUST BE pre-approved (email: equestrian@houghton.edu) and pay \$50 early arrival fee; Pre-approved early arrival stalls will be ready. Early arrivals WITHOUT pre-approval must pay a \$100 early arrival fee & wait for a stall to be readied. A separate \$50 stall cleaning check to Houghton University is required—check will be returned or shredded if stall is clean prior to leaving the show premises. A stall fee or trailer in/grounds fee must be paid for every horse.

<u>Groups</u> Please note stabling groups with your entry. Your group should decide on a "group name" that all competitors provide on their entry. Stabling requests honored when possible.

<u>Arenas/Footing/Warm-Up</u> Sand & rubber mix in outdoor competition and all warm-up arenas. Indoor competition arena has GGT footing. **All** tests will be ridden in 20m x 60m arena, except Para Dressage Levels I-III. Competition Arenas open for schooling 3:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. Thursday & after last Friday class until 7:00 p.m. Warm-up Arenas and Lunging Arena available throughout shows and until 8:00 p.m. Thursday & 7:00pm Friday. Lunging permitted in designated areas only.

No one on foot (except leadline handlers, ring stewards, equipment checkers, emergency medical service, and show management) is allowed in designated warmups. Coaches, trainers, spectators, and other unmounted individuals must stand outside fence or

partition of warm-up arenas. All horses in the warmup arenas must wear their current issued competition numbers. If tack adjustments or rider changes are needed, personnel must perform them outside of the arena.

AWARDS

<u>Scores</u> It is the responsibility of the competitor to verify the accuracy of all scores. Scoring errors must be reported to the Show Secretary within one hour of the official posting of the scores from the last class of the show day during which the score was earned.

<u>Ties</u> In the case of equality of points, the competitor with the highest marks received under General Impressions shall be declared the winner. When the scores for General Impressions are equal after coefficients have been applied, the horses must remain tied. Errors on a test may not be used to break ties. [DR123.3]

<u>Class Awards</u> Ribbons will be presented for first through sixth place. When classes are posted as final, you may pick up your ribbons. Qualifying classes will not be pinned separately. Separate sets of ribbons will be awarded for JR/YR, AA, and Open divisions within classes. High Score Champion and Reserve Champion ribbons will be awarded each day for overall High Point rides.

MANAGEMENT RIGHTS & SHOW POLICIES

Show Management reserves the right to change officials, rotate rings, limit entries, add, combine or cancel classes insufficiently filled, modify the schedule or reschedule classes after due notice to exhibitors, and modify or cancel awards and/or make whatever changes are required by circumstances to the competition specifications listed herein.

Show Management reserves the right to refuse or require withdrawal of an entry, accept conditionally, or to cancel any entries, disqualify any riders or exhibitors, and/or prohibit entries deemed sufficient by Show Management without claims for damages.

Every horse entered for competition will comply with the rules of the horse show management, but management will, in no case, be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur, and it shall be condition of entry that each exhibitor shall hold this horse show and the officials and employees of the show blameless for any loss or accident to his horse, employees, equipment, which may occur from sickness, fire or otherwise.

Exhibitors are notified that any act of discourtesy or disobedience to the judges or officials, on the part of the owner, manager, rider, or groom shall disqualify the horse, and the owner shall forfeit his entry fee and other fees.

Show management reserves to itself the power to prohibit any person from attending or showing a horse in the ring and to remove any groom or horse from the show without being liable for compensation.

No person will be allowed in the show ring during the time of judging except the exhibitor and those having official or requested duties to perform.

It is the tradition of the show that riders be correctly attired for the class in question, that attendants be neatly dressed and the horses properly presented. Management may in its discretion bar any person from entering the ring if not suitable presented to appear before an audience.

Show Management reserves the right to interpret all questions and conditions regarding or arising out of any incident in the show without claims for damages or recourse of any kind. All guestions not covered in these rules and regulations shall be decided by the horse show management; their decision will be final.

Drugs & Alcohol: The competition grounds, Houghton University Equestrian Center, is a smoke, drug and alcohol free facility. The consumption, purchase, distribution, or possession of illegal drugs, cannabis (in all of its various forms), alcoholic beverages, or smoking/vaping of products while on-campus is prohibited. Those failing to follow these requirements will be asked to leave the competition grounds.

Dogs are not permitted to be loose on competition grounds and must be held on a leash or otherwise restrained. Harris County leash law will be enforced. Individuals must not lead dogs on a leash while mounted. Dog owners are solely responsible for any damages, claims, losses or actions resulting from their dogs' behaviors. Dog owners failing to comply with this rule will be issued a Yellow warning card and may be subject to penalty under Chapters 6 and 7. (GR1301.6) No other pets or livestock other than horses and mules allowed on grounds.

USDF Statement on Animal Welfare

The United States Dressage Federation, Inc. (USDF), a federation of over 100 independent organizations throughout the United States with a membership of nearly 30,000 members, supports the concept of ethical treatment of animals.

Dressage is a classical method of training horses, based upon the horse's natural responses, as carried out in a gradual, planned program during whic the horse's athletic abilities are improved in a systematic manner. As a result, the horse becomes capable, comfortable, and responsive in partnership with the rider without the use of force. Dressage competition at various levels of achievement is the ultimate test of the training program to determine whether the desired harmony between horse and rider has been achieved.

The rules pertaining to dressage competition prohibit the use of artificial appliances, training aids, and drugs, which would force the horse to submit. Instead, the emphasis is upon training and a cooperative partnership with the rider. Major competitions are carefully monitored to assure that there is no unnecessary force or harshness displayed.

Unlike other horse sports in which horses enter training at a relatively immature state, dressage training is usually not seriously begun until the horse is three or four. The top levels of achievement require five or more years of progressive training and it is not unusual to see horses in international competition in their late teens. This, in itself, places a premium on good care and soundness throughout the horse's life.

While supporting the concept of animal welfare in its broadest form, the United States Dressage Federation, Inc., also recognizes that it is unrealistic to ascribe human emotions and responses to the horse which in its wild state is a creature of flight, living a hard and precedious existence. Under domes-tication, the horse is assured of ample food, water, and shelter, as well as protection against infectious diseases and damaging parasites, thus leading a longer and healthier life with a high rate of survival.

As an educational organization, USDF has numerous programs, which teach people how to pursue the accepted, humane training methods. A program of certifying instructors also emphasizes protecting the horse's welfare in pursuit of dressage training

LIABILITY INFORMATION

<u>Liability</u> Horses by their inherent nature present a risk. **Neither the organizing/show committee, the show volunteers and staff**, the facility or its owners, any host GMO, USEF or USDF or their members will be responsible for any damage, injury, loss to persons, horses, or property of exhibitors or spectators/attendees. All owners and competitors are personally responsible for damages to third parties caused by themselves, their employees, their agents or their horses. They are therefore strongly advised to take out third-party insurance providing full coverage for participation in equestrian events at home and abroad, and to keep the policy up-to-date.

Each participant in an equestrian activity expressly assumes the risk of and legal responsibility for any injury, loss or damage to person or property which results from participation in an equestrian activity. Each participant shall have the sole individual responsibility for knowing the range of his or her own ability to manage, care for, and control a particular horse or perform a particular equestrian activity, and it shall be the duty of each participant to act within the limits of the participant's own ability, to maintain reasonable control of the particular horse or horses at all times while participating in an equestrian activity, to heed all posted warnings, to perform equestrian activities only in an area or in facilities designated by the horseman and to refrain from acting in a manner which may cause or contribute to the injury of anyone. If while actually riding in an equestrian event, any participant collides with any object or person, except an obviously intoxicated person of whom the horseman is aware, or if the participant falls from the horse or from a horse-drawn conveyance, the responsibility for such collision or fall shall be solely that of the participant or participants involved and not that of the horseman.

<u>Accidents</u> A participant involved in an accident shall not depart from the area or facility where the equestrian activity took place without leaving personal identification, including name and address, or without notifying the proper authorities, or without obtaining assistance when that person knows or reasonably should know that any other person involved in the accident is in need of medical or other assistance.

<u>Important notice to all affected parties</u> Third parties may come upon the property or enter the facilities where any herein described or listed event will occur; provided, that this is a license to enter the premises, for the purpose of observing or participating in the event, but not otherwise, and such license to any individual is subject to revocation by the owner, lessee or organizer, and entry for any purpose other than granted herein, shall be deemed criminal trespass and subject to appropriate legal proceedings.

US EQUESTRIAN FEDERATION RULES

"EVERY CLASS OFFERED HEREIN WHICH IS COVERED BY THE RULES AND SPECIFICATIONS OF THE CURRENT FEDERATION RULE BOOK WILL BE CONDUCTED AND JUDGED IN ACCORDANCE THEREWITH." US EQUESTRIAN FEDERATION rules are in force from the moment show management allows access to the show grounds. This includes conduct, correct saddlery and equipment, and attire.

<u>USEF MEMBERSHIP STATEMENT</u> DR901.9 Life, senior active and junior active members shall be eligible to participate in all classes at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions at the Modified Level or above and Combined Driving Competitions at the Advanced Level, Dressage, Reining and Vaulting Competitions and Endurance Rides. A non-member may participate as a handler, rider, driver, owner, lessee, or agent, at Regular Competitions, Eventing Competitions, Dressage Competitions, Reining Competitions and Combined Driving Competitions upon payment of a Show Pass fee. Participants in the following classes are exempted from the Requirements of this rule: 1) leadline; 2) exhibitions; 3) games and races; 4) classes for 4-H members; 5) walk trot (exception: Friesian performance FR231) and academy classes (academy classes are classes limited to horses used regularly in a lesson program); 6) USDF introductory level tests, pas de deux and quadrille classes; 7) NRHA Endorsed Reining Competitions. 8) Opportunity classes, 9) citizens of other nations who have proof, in English, of current membership in good standing of their own National Federation, 10) USEA beginner novice division; and 11) assistant handlers in Dressage Sport Horse Breeding classes

MOTORIZED VEHICLE RULE In accordance with GR1301.7: Minors who do not have a valid driver's license which allows them to operate a motorized vehicle in the state in which they reside will not be permitted to operate a motorized vehicle of any kind, including, but not limited to, golf carts, motorcycles, scooters, or farm utility vehicles, on the competition grounds of licensed competitions. Minors who have a valid temporary license may operate the above described motorized vehicles as long as they are accompanied by an adult with a valid driver's license. The parent/legal guardian or individual who signs the entry blank as a parent or guardian of a minor

operating a motorized vehicle in violation of this rule are solely responsible for any damages, claims, losses or actions resulting from that operation. Violations of this rule will be cause for penalties against those responsible for the child committing the offense. Wheelchairs and other mobility assistance devices for individuals with disabilities are exempt from this rule. The unsafe use of personal electronic transport devices, as determined by the competition officials and management in their sole discretion, that do not require a driver's license to operate, including but not limited to segways, hover boards, and single wheeled scooters is prohibited on competition grounds. Operating such devices in areas where people gather may be deemed "unsafe use" if there is a risk of harm to others. If the operator of the device is a minor, the parent/legal guardian or individual who signs the entry blank as a parent or guardian of a minor operating the device in violation of this rule is accountable and may be subject to penalties. Wheelchairs and other mobility assistance devices for individuals with disabilities are exempt from this rule.

<u>Sharps Containers</u> Competition management shall place a minimum of one sharps container per each competition, whether or not stabling is provided. Additionally, at least one sharps container per fifty occupied stalls for the disposal of needles and other disposable sharp instruments in convenient locations in barns housing competition horses. It is competition management's responsibility to replace such containers when full and dispose of them properly. **Competition management may fine any individuals including trainers, owners, exhibitors, or their agents up to \$100 for improper disposal of needles or other sharp disposable instruments.** Please do not use garbage cans for this material. If local law has different requirements, local law will prevail.

<u>Protective Headgear Rule DR120.6</u> Current USEF helmet policy will be strictly enforced.

Reminder All USEF Life and Senior Active members, as well as participants who have regular contact with minor athletes, are required to comply with the U.S. Center for SafeSport training requirement to be eligible to participate in the competition. All participants must adhere to the U.S. Center for SafeSport Code, USEF Safe Sport Policy, and the Minor Athlete Abuse Prevention Policies. From NW (Buffalo, NY area, CANADA): Follow route 400 S to end. Continue S on route 16 through small towns of South Wales, Holland, and Chaffee. In Yorkshire, turn left at traffic light on route 39 E. Follow route 39 E for a little over 3 miles into small town of Arcade. Just after crossing RR tracks in Arcade, turn left at traffic light at T-intersection on route 98 S. Follow route 98 S to route 243. Bear left on route 243 (do NOT turn right on route 98!). Follow route 243 to end at T-intersection with blinking light in Caneadea. Turn left at blinking light on route 19 N. Go 3 miles on route 19 N. At south edge of Houghton, just after 35 MPH sign, turn left up Tucker Hill Road (sign for "Houghton University Equestrian Center" is on the corner). Go 0.9 mile up Tucker Hill Road. Turn right on School Farm Road (sign for "Houghton University Equestrian Center is on the corner). Bear right on driveway at end of pavement.

From NE (Rochester, NY area): Follow route 390 S to exit for Mt. Morris. At bottom of exit ramp, turn left on route 408. Follow route 408 through Mt. Morris (left at light at top of hill, go ½ block, right at next light, then about 11 miles) to town of Nunda. At 4-way stop intersection in Nunda, turn right on route 436 W. Follow route 436 W to Portageville where it crosses a bridge over the Genesee River, turns right, and ends at T-intersection on route 19-A. Turn left on route 19-A S. Follow route 19-A S to end at blinker light in small town of Fillmore. Continue straight through intersection on route 19 S for 4 miles to Houghton. Drive through Houghton to south edge of town (about 0.5 mile). Turn right up Tucker Hill Road (sign for "Houghton University Equestrian Center on corner). Go 0.9 mile up Tucker Hill Road and turn right on School Farm Road (another sign for "Houghton University Equestrian Center" is on the corner). Bear right on driveway at end of pavement.

From the South: Drive north to route I-86. Follow I-86 to exit 30 (Houghton is one of the towns on the green exit sign). Turn N on route 19. Follow route 19 N to south edge of Houghton (about 14 miles). Turn left up Tucker Hill Road (sign for "Houghton University Equestrian Center" is on the corner). Go 0.9 mile up Tucker Hill Road. Turn right on School Farm Road (another sign for "Houghton University Equestrian Center" is on the corner). Bear right on driveway at end of pavement.

Once you arrive at Houghton University Equestrian Center, stop by the Event Center on the north (driveway) end of the large indoor arena. Inside the Event Center you can pick up your competitor packet and stall assignments. You can then drive to park briefly near your stall to unload your horse(s) and gear, then drive to the large gravel parking lot to leave your rig. The grounds are set up so that you can always drive forward to get from one spot to the next, with NO backing needed.
